




THE CHURCH AGE BEGINS

TRAVEL TO JERUSALEM ACTS 21:1-14

Acts 21:1, "Now it came to pass, that when we had departed from them and set sail, running a straight course we came to Cos, the following day to Rhodes, and from there to Patara.

Acts 21:2, "And finding a ship sailing over to Phoenicia, we went aboard and set sail."





Acts 21:3, "When we had sighted Cyprus, we passed it on the left, sailed to Syria, and landed at Tyre; for there the ship was to unload her cargo."

Acts 21:4, "And finding disciples, we stayed there seven days. They told Paul through the Spirit [dia pneumatos] not to go up to Jerusalem."

Acts 19:21, "When these things were accomplished, Paul purposed in the Spirit [en to pneumati], when he had passed through Macedonia and Achaia, to go to Jerusalem, saying, 'After I have been there, I must also see Rome.'

Acts 20:22, "And see, now I go bound in the Spirit [to pneumati] to Jerusalem, not knowing the things that will happen to me there,"

Acts 20:24, "But none of these things move me; nor do I count my life dear to myself, so that I may finish my race with joy, and the ministry which I received from the Lord Jesus, to testify to the gospel of the grace of God."

Acts 1:2, "until the day when He was taken up to heaven, after He had by the Holy Spirit [dia pneumatos] given orders to the apostles whom He had chosen."

Acts 4:25, "who by the Holy Spirit [dia pneumatos], through the mouth of our father David Your servant, said, 'WHY DID THE GENTILES RAGE, AND THE PEOPLES DEVISE FUTILE THINGS?'"

Acts 11:28, "One of them named Agabus stood up and began to indicate by the Spirit [dia pneumatos] that there would certainly be a great famine all over the world. And this took place in the reign of Claudius."

Rom. 5:5, "and hope does not disappoint, because the love of God has been poured out within our hearts through the Holy Spirit who was given to us."

1 Cor. 2:10, "For to us God revealed them through the Spirit; for the Spirit searches all things, even the depths of God."

1 Cor. 12:8, "For to one is given the word of wisdom through the Spirit, and to another the word of knowledge according to the same Spirit;"

Conclusion

Option 1: Luke and/or the Holy Spirit contradicts himself.

Option 2: Paul has misunderstood the guidance of the Spirit and the disciples in Tyre have it right.

Option 3: The disciples in Tyre receive the same message Paul has been getting about persecution if he goes to Jerusalem, and their reaction is to tell Paul to not go to Jerusalem.

Option 4: The disciples in Tyre are just wrong.

dia tou pneumatos in Acts 21:4 is difficult, since the advice not to go on to Jerusalem given to Paul by the Tyrian disciples (= prophets? cf. Acts 11:28) "through the Spirit" conflicted with his own resolve "in the Spirit" (en tō pneumati, Acts 19:21) and with the constraint and testimony of the Spirit (Acts 20:22f). It is noteworthy that Agabus's subsequent prophecy at Caesarea (Acts 21:11) that predicts Paul's suffering in Jerusalem and begins ...

"Thus says the Holy Spirit" does not include an injunction or exhortation to Paul not to go to Jerusalem (but cf. Acts 21:12–14). Perhaps therefore the crucial prepositional phrase in Acts 21:4 should be rendered "while under the inspiration of the Spirit" (but C. F. D. Moule, Idiom-Book, 57 tentatively suggests "as a spiritual insight").

In his condensed statement Luke has not distinguished between a prophecy regarding Paul's suffering at Jerusalem (doubtless given by the Tyrian disciples before their exhortation) that was delivered at the direction of the Spirit (cf. Acts 21:11) and their own personal exhortation (cf. Acts 21:12) that was occasioned by the prediction and immediately followed it. The verse may be paraphrased thus: "Prompted by a prediction of the Spirit they told Paul not to go on to Jerusalem."

Acts 21:5, "When we had come to the end of those days, we departed and went on our way; and they all accompanied us, with wives and children, till we were out of the city. And we knelt down on the shore and prayed.

Acts 21:6, "When we had taken our leave of one another, we boarded the ship, and they returned home."

Acts 21:7, "And when we had finished our voyage from Tyre, we came to Ptolemais, greeted the brethren, and stayed with them one day.

Acts 21:8, "On the next day we who were Paul's companions departed and came to Caesarea, and entered the house of Philip the evangelist, who was one of the seven, and stayed with him.

Acts 21:9, "Now this man had four virgin daughters who prophesied."

- 1 Chron. 25:1, "Moreover David and the captains of the army separated for the service some of the sons of Asaph, of Heman, and of Jeduthun, who should prophesy with harps, stringed instruments, and cymbals. And the number of the skilled men performing their service was:

1 Sam. 10:6, "Then the Spirit of the LORD will come upon you, and you will prophesy with them and be turned into another man."

Ex. 15:20, "Then Miriam the prophetess, the sister of Aaron, took the timbrel in her hand; and all the women went out after her with timbrels and with dances."

Judges 4:4, "Now Deborah, a prophetess, the wife of Lapidoth, was judging Israel at that time."
