COLOSSIANS: Jesus Christ is All-Sufficient

**Christ and the Church
Colossians 1:18**

Col. 1:18, “And He is the head of the body, the church, who is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, that in all things He may have the preeminence.”

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κεφαλή (*kephalē*), head

- 1. Literal meaning: the physical part of the body that contains the brain;**
- 2. Metaphorical meaning: describes superiority or authority, but in Greek it never describes source or origin;**

**also used to refer to the “chief” or head
cornerstone (Mark 12:10; Acts 4:11) related to
the uppermost part or extremity.**

Four Realms of Authority

1. ***Dispensationally*, Christ was to have been the chief or HEAD cornerstone for Israel at His first coming, and will be at His second (Acts 4:11; 1 Peter 2:7).**
2. ***Humanity*, Christ is the Head of every man (male) (1 Cor. 11:3).**
3. ***Ecclesiologically*, Christ is the Head of the church, His bride (Eph. 5:23; Rev. 19:6–8).**
4. ***Cosmically*, Christ is the Head of principalities and powers and has the universal lordship (Col. 2:10).**

Eph. 1:22, “And He put all things under His feet, and gave Him to be head over all things to the church,

Eph. 1:23, “which is His body, the fullness of Him who fills all in all.”
