
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τὸ τέλος *to telos* "the end" ἥγγικεν *enniken*, from *engizo* "to be near"

PROPHETIC PANORAMA



1. τὸ τέλος is used 40× in the Greek New Testament, in 39 verses. 14 in the Gospels, none in Acts, 23× in the Epistles, 3× in Revelation.

2. Lexica

τέλος (telos), end, conclusion, close, goal; NIDNTT BDAG

- 1 a point of time marking the end of a duration, end, termination, cessation; 1 Pet. 4:7
- 2 the last part of a process, close, conclusion
- 3 the goal toward which a movement is being directed, end, goal, outcome
- 4 last in a series, rest, remainder
- 5 revenue obligation, (indirect) tax, toll-tax, customs duties

- 1 Pet. 4:5, "They will give an account to Him who is ready to judge the living and the dead. [Great White Throne]
- 1 Pet. 4:6, "For this reason the gospel was preached also to those who are dead, that they, on the one hand, might be judged according to men in the flesh, but, on the other hand, live according to God in the [S]pirit." [Judgment Seat of Christ]

The second key word is ἤγγικεν ἐγγίζω eggizō perf act indic 3 sing to bring near, come near, approach James 5:8, "You also be patient. Establish your hearts, for the coming of the Lord is at hand."

1 Cor. 15:24, "Then comes the end, when He delivers the kingdom to God the Father, when He puts an end to all rule and all authority and power."

εἶτα; eita, adverb of time, "then; next; after that" does not imply immediacy

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παραδίδωμι paradidōmi or παραδω paradō pres act subj 3 sing to deliver, deliver over or Aor Act Subj.

καταργέω katargeō aor act subj 3 sing to leave idle, occupy, make of no effect, nullify

1 Cor. 15:25, "For He must reign till He has put all enemies under His feet."

- 1. He must reign, and His reign is over enemies.
- 2. The reign ends when He vanquishes His enemies.
- 3. "Under His feet", His footstool, Psa. 110:1

Psa. 110:1, "The LORD said to my Lord, 'Sit at My right hand, till I make Your enemies Your footstool.'

Psa. 110:2, "The LORD shall send the rod of Your strength out of Zion. Rule in the midst of Your enemies!"

Psa. 110:5, "The Lord is at Your right hand; He shall execute kings in the day of Hiswrath. (Tribulation or end of Millennium?)

Psa. 110:6, "He shall judge among the nations, He shall fill the places with dead bodies, He shall execute the heads of many countries.

Psa. 110:7, "He shall drink of the brook by the wayside; Therefore He shall lift up the head."

1 Pet. 4:7, "But the end of all things is at hand; therefore be <u>serious</u> and <u>watchful</u> in your prayers."

σωφρονέω *sōphroneō* aor act <u>impera</u> 2 plur "to be in a right mind"

νήφω *nēphō* aor act <u>impera</u> 2 plur "to be sober, self-controlled"

σωφρονέω sōphroneō to be in a right mind; clear thinking, thinking objectively

σωφρονέω *sōphroneō* to be in a right mind; clear thinking, thinking objectively

The meaning is given in Od., 23, 10–14, where sōphrosynē, prudence, self-control, is an antonym of ignorance and frivolity and has a corresponding positive sense. The eudaemonism which pervades these early ethical ideas—happiness is the greatest good—is consolidated in Plato into the doctrine of the four cardinal virtues (cf. F. Ueberweg, History of Philosophy, I, 1888, 128): wisdom (sophia), courage (andreia), prudence (sōphrosynē), and justice

prudent adjective 1. careful, cautious, circumspect, discerning, discreet, judicious, politic, sensible, shrewd, vigilant, wary, wise; adjective 2. canny, careful, economical, far-sighted, frugal, provident, sparing, thrifty

Antonyms (sense 1) <u>careless</u>, heedless, impolitic, <u>inconsiderate</u>, <u>indiscreet</u>, injudicious, irrational, rash, thoughtless, unwise, careless, extravagant, improvident, imprudent, wasteful

OED acting with or showing care and thought for the future.

Collins 21st: 1. discreet or cautious in managing one's activities; circumspect.

2. practical and careful in providing for the future. 3. exercising good judgment or common sense.

Webster: a: marked by wisdom or judiciousness (prudent advice)

b: shrewd in the management of practical affairs (prudent investors)

c: marked by circumspection: discreet

νήφω $n\bar{e}ph\bar{o}$ aor act impera 2 plur to be sober, self-controlled

- 1 Pet. 1:13, "Therefore gird up the loins of your mind, be sober, and rest your hope fully upon the grace that is to be brought to you at the revelation of Jesus Christ;"
- 1 Pet. 4:7, "But the end of all things is at hand; therefore be serious and watchful in your prayers."
- 1 Pet. 5:8, "Be sober, be vigilant; because your adversary the devil walks about like a roaring lion, seeking whom he may devour."
