



* The Mosaic Law did not begin the ethical or spiritual absolutes stated there, but encased them in the Law of Israel. This is analogous to their political constitution for the nation. Just as murder, theft, perjury were wrong before the Constitution of the US, they were included within the law of the land.

* The summary principles for loving the Lord our God with all of our being is repeated in the New Testament. The only one of the 10 commandments not repeated in the New **Testament is the Sabbath Law.**

<u>Covenant Theology</u>: All laws of the Torah are still in effect unless they were specifically repealed. This is consistent with their overall theology of one people of God. **Dispensationalism: All of the Mosaic Law was abolished at** the Cross; unless commands were repeated in the New Testament, they are abolished. Every commandment of the 10 was repeated except the Sabbath.

1. The starting point for understanding love is God.

<u>1 John 4:8, "He who does</u> for God is love."

<u>1 John 4:16</u>, "And we have known and believed the love that God has for us. <u>God is love</u>, and he who abides in love abides in God, and God in him."

b. Christian love is the context. Love for one another, which is a fruit of the Spirit, manifests when and as a result of

John 14:7, " 'If you had known Me, you would have known My Father also; and from now on you know Him and have seen Him.'

John 14:8, "Philip said to Him, 'Lord, show us the Father, and it is sufficient for us.'

John 14:9, "Jesus said to him, 'Have I been with you so long, and yet you have not known Me, Philip? He who has seen Me has seen the Father; so how can you say, "Show us the Father" '?"

<u>1 John 2:3, "Now by this we know that we know Him, if we</u> keep His commandments. <u>1 John 2:4, "He who says, 'I know Him,' and does not keep</u> His commandments, is a liar, and the truth is not in him."

c. 1 John 4:9–10 are the basis for this point.

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<u>1 John 4:10</u>, "In this is love, not that we loved God, but that <u>He loved us and sent His Son to be the propitiation</u> for our sins.

<u>1 John 4:11, "Beloved, if God so loved us, we also ought to love one another.</u>"

<u>1 John 4:9</u>, "In this the love of God was manifested toward us, that God has sent His only begotten Son into the world, that we might live through Him."

d. God's love is made manifest, i.e., revealed to us. "That" introduces the way it was revealed: God sent His only begotten Son into the world, for the purpose that we might live.

<u>1 John 4:10, "In this is love, not that we loved God, but that</u> <u>He loved us and sent His Son to be the propitiation for our</u> sins."

e. Verse 10 reiterates: His love is demonstrated through sending His Son to be the propitiation for our sins.

<u>1 John 4:11, "Beloved, if God so loved us, we also ought to love one another."</u>

f. If (since) God loved us in this way, we also ought to love one another.

John 3:16, "For God loved the world in this way: He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life."

<u>Rom. 5:8,</u> "But God demonstrates His own love toward us, in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us."

3. An attempted definition:

Love is a mental attitude toward others which desires the best for them according to the standards of God's integrity and acts toward them consistent with that desire and standards.
