2 Corinthians 10:1-11:4

- I. Paul's appeal to the church, 2 Corinthians 10:1-2
 - A. A personal plea to prepare for his visit, v. 1
 - Now I, Paul, myself am pleading with you, v. 1
 - with Christlike humility,
 - when present lowly, cast down, base
 - when absent bold toward you, confident

- I. Paul's appeal to the church, Cont. 2 Corinthians 10:1-2
 - B. Who is the "you", v. 1 Those who:
 - Think of us as though we walked according to the flesh. v. 2b
 - look at things according to outward appearance.
 - who measure themselves by themselves, v. 12
 - who commend himself, v. 18
 - who are open to false teaching, 11:4
 - who are false apostles, deceitful, ... 11:13
 - who are ministers of Satan, 11:15

I. Paul's appeal to the church, cont. 2 Cor. 10:1-2

C. Paul's reason for this discourse, v. 2

1. To prepare them for his upcoming visit, v. 2a

2. To address those who "Think of us as though we walked according to the flesh." v. 2b

II. Paul's approach to spiritual warfare, 2 Cor. 10:3-6

The accusation: Walking according to the flesh. v. 2b

The <u>defense</u>: "Though we walk in the flesh, we do not war according to the flesh." v. 3

- 1. Their weapons were of the Spirit and not carnal. v. 4a
- 2. Their <u>weapons</u> are "<u>mighty in God</u> for pulling down strongholds." v. 4b

II. Paul's approach to spiritual warfare, 2 Cor. 10:3-6

The "mighty in God" weapons: (Eph. 6:14-18)

The waist girded with the Truth. v. 14a

Wearing the breastplate of righteousness. v. 14b

Feet shod with the gospel of peace. v. 15

Bearing the shield of faith. v. 16

Wearing the helmet of salvation. v. 17a

Carry the sword of the Spirit. v. 17b

"Praying always with all prayers ..." v. 18

II. Paul's approach to spiritual warfare, 2 Cor. 10:3-6

Strongholds to be pulled down: v. 5

1. "Casting Down arguments," v. 5a

2. "Casting down every high thing that exalts itself against the knowledge of God." v. 5b

- 3. "Bringing every thought into captivity & obedience" v. 5b
- 4. "Being ready to avenge all disobedience." v. 6

- III. Paul's defense to the opposition, 2 Cor. 10:7-11
 - A. The question: v. 7
 - "Do you look at things according to outward appearance only?" 2 Cor. 10:7
 - B. Paul's boast about his authority, 2 Cor. 10:8-10

His authority was:

- 1. From the Lord, "which the Lord gave us." v. 8
- 2. For edification and not destruction, v. 8b
- 3. It was restrained. vv. 9-1-10
- Therefore it will be what you see is what you get. v. 11

- IV. Paul's words to the enemies, 2 Cor. 10:12-18
- A. A God-appointed sphere of authority, vv. 12-13
 - 1. The "not wise" comparison, vv. 12-13
 - 2. They where within their sphere, v. 14
 - 3. He was not boasting of "other men's labors." v. 15
 - 4. Paul's desire was to, "preach the gospel in the regions beyond you," v. 16

IV. Paul's words to the enemies, cont. 2 Cor. 10:12-18

B. A caution: "But he who glories, let him glory in the Lord"

"For not he who commends himself is approved, but whom the Lord commends." v. 18

The final analysis is the Lord's commendation.

2 Cor. 10:17
