What is a Divine Institution?

Absolute social structures instituted by God for the entire human race—believers and unbelievers alike.

Designed by God for the "perpetuation, preservation, protection, and prosperity of the human race."

"the protection, conservation, fostering, and improvement of human life." ~Martin Luther

A Divine Institution is not a social construct.

WHAT IS A FAMILY?

... the union of one man and one woman in marriage which has been blessed with one or several natural or adopted children.

... an organic union that combines father, mother, and children (natural or adopted) into a cohesive unit—

Thus both parents, father and mother, are integral in the rearing and training of their children to enable them to be adults who live lives to glorify God, and to be a blessing to those around them, and the surrounding culture and civilization. <u>Gen. 1:26,</u> "Then God said, 'Let Us make man in Our image, according to Our likeness; ...'

<u>Gen. 1:27</u>, "So God created man in His own image; in the image of God He created him; male and female He created them." <u>Gen. 1:28,</u> "Then God blessed them, and God said to them, 'Be fruitful and multiply; fill the earth and subdue it; have dominion over the fish of the sea, over the birds of the air, and over every living thing that moves on the earth.' " **Deut. 6:6**, "And these words which I command you today shall be in your heart.

~Thomas Jefferson, letter to Francis Willis, Jr., April 18, 1790 "It is the duty of parents to maintain their children decently, and according to their circumstances; to protect them according to the dictates of prudence; and to educate them according to the suggestions of a judicious and zealous regard for their usefulness, their respectability and happiness."
