

# **Literary Features**

"Meanwhile I simply remark, that it relates not so much to the particular psalm to which it is annexed, as to the book or division of the Psalter which ends with that psalm — the second of the five books of which the whole is made up. It implies therefore that **every Psalm of David** may be correctly described as **a Prayer of David**."

**Literary Features** 

"Every psalm is a prayer, but every prayer is not a psalm. To the production of the psalms art was required, — the art of the poet and the art of the musician."

# **Literary Features**

"And here it may be remarked, that these two titles (Psalm/Song) not only distinguish the psalms from ordinary prayers, and from such prose compositions as we possess in the Bible histories and epistles, but also from such poetical compositions as are found in Job, in the Proverbs, and in the prophets."

**Literary Features** 

"They are not only **Prayers** and **Songs**, but **Hymns** also; that is to say, they are **songs which** have for their chief scope the glory and praise of God."

**Literary Features** 

"It holds forth, as **one of the purposes** they were designed to serve, **the edification of souls** in the truth and ways of the Lord."

# **Literary Features**

"The psalm differs from some other kinds of sacred song in these **two points**, that it is, in every instance **the fruit of supernatural inspiration**; and that it is, in every instance, **designed for permanent use in the public worship of God**."
