



Two Interpretations:

either refers to Phase 1 Justification or Phase 2 Sanctification.

1. By far the most popular way to understand this verse is that it relates to salvation. The "good work" mentioned

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 - **Two forms:** them to grow if they are willing.

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a. God graciously works in the believer's life to enable

The Reformed/Lordship/Calvinist View

French Confession of Faith of 1559 (Article XXI) claims the verse for perseverance:

"We believe also that faith is given to the elect not only to introduce them into the right way, but also to make them continue in it to the end. For as it is God who hath begun the work, He will also perfect it."

The Reformed/Lordship/Calvinist View

The Lordship Salvation of John MacArthur:

"That ongoing work of grace in the Christian's life is as much a certainty as justification, glorification, or any other aspect of God's redeeming work ... [Php. 1:6 is quoted] ... Salvation is wholly God's work, and He finishes what He starts. His grace is sufficient. And potent. It cannot be defective in any regard."

What does "fellowship" mean?

Php. 1:5, "for your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now," ~RD

κοινωνία koinōnia fem sing dat fellowship, participation; society; <u>partnership</u>

focus on the Philippians' financial contribution and partnership for the expansion of the gospel ministry.

Paul uses koinonia and sugkoinonea as key words which

<u>Php. 1:7</u>, "just as it is right for me to think this of you all, because I have you in my heart, inasmuch as both in my chains and in the defense and confirmation of the gospel, you all are <u>partakers</u> with me of grace."

συγκοινωνός (synkoinōnos)

Php. 4:15, "Now you Philippians know also that in the beginning of the gospel, when I departed from Macedonia, no church <u>shared</u> with me concerning giving and receiving but you only." κοινωνέω (*koinōneō*)

Php. 4:14, "Nevertheless you have done well that you shared in my distress." ~NKJV Php. 4:14, "Yet it was kind of you to share my trouble." ~ESV

The ESV has a note by "share" that this means to have fellowship in Paul's adversities.

Php. 4:14, "Nevertheless you have done well that you shared in my distress." ~NKJV

συγκοινωνέω sugkoinōneō aorist act participle masc plur nom to take part in; participate in with someone, be connected with, share

"you were partners in my adversity"

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κοινωνέω *koinōneō* 3 sing <u>aor</u> act indic to share, take part, participate in, <u>give/</u> <u>contribute or be a partner</u> in

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<u>Rom. 15:26</u>, "For it pleased those from Macedonia and Achaia to make a certain <u>contribution for the poor</u> among the saints who are in Jerusalem." ~NKJV

<u>2 Cor. 9:13</u>, "while, through the proof of this ministry, they glorify God for the obedience of your confession to the gospel of Christ, and for your <u>liberal sharing with them</u> and all men," ~NKJV

<u>2 Cor. 9:13</u>, "By their approval [positive evaluation] of this service, they will glorify God because of your submission that comes from your confession of the gospel of Christ, and the generosity of your contribution for them and for all others," ~ESV

Php. 1:5, "for your partnership for [eis] the gospel from the first day until now," ~RD

The first day of the congregation sending financial contributions to Paul (Php. 4:15)

<u>Php. 1:6</u>, "being confident of this very thing, that He who has <u>begun a good work</u> in you will complete it until the day of Jesus Christ;" ~NKJV

Php. 1:5, "for your fellowship in the gospel from the first day until now," κοινωνία (koinōnia)

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"Rather ergon agathon finds its explanation in the fact that the Philippians were partners with Paul in the gospel (v. 5), and shared their resources with him to make the proclamation of the gospel possible. This 'sharing in the gospel' is the good work referred to here (cf. 2 Cor. 8:6) [italics original]."

<u>2 Cor. 8:1, "Moreover, brethren, we make known to you the</u> grace of God which had already been given among the churches of Macedonia:

of their liberality.

<u>2 Cor. 8:3, "For I bear witness that according to their</u> ability, yes, and beyond their ability, they were freely willing,"

<u>2 Cor. 8:2, "that in a great trial of affliction the abundance</u> of their joy and their deep poverty abounded in the riches

<u>2 Cor. 8:4</u>, "imploring us with much urgency that we would receive the gift and <u>the fellowship [koinonia]</u> of the ministering [diakonia] to the saints."

<u>2 Cor. 8:7, "But as you abound in everything—in faith, in</u> speech, in knowledge, in all diligence, and in your love for us—see that you <u>abound</u> in this grace also. 2 Cor. 8:8, "I speak not by commandment, but I am evaluating the integrity of your love by the diligence of others. **<u>2 Cor. 8:9</u>**, "For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though He was rich, yet for your sakes He became poor, that you through His poverty might become rich."

<u>2 Cor. 8:10</u>, "And in this I give advice: It is to your advantage not only to be doing what you began and were desiring to do a year ago;
<u>2 Cor. 8:11</u>, "but now you also must complete the doing of it; that as there was a readiness to desire it, so there also may be a completion out of what you have."
