SURVEY WORKS ON AMERICAN CHRISTIANITY

- Ahlstrom, Sidney E. *A Religious History of the American People*. New Haven: Yale University Press, 1972. A standard and classic study, but is now a bit dated.
- Ambrose, Stephen E. *To America: Personal Reflections of an Historian*. New York: Simon & Schuster, 2003.
- **Barton, David and Tim Barton. *The American Story: The Beginnings*. Second Edition. Aledo, TX: WallBuilder Press, 2021. The Bartons do a fine job with extensive footnotes and documentation. Their focus is telling history through the people involved. The greatest weakness I have found is that they do not distinguish “Christian” sect leaders such as William Penn (Quaker), and Unitarians, i.e., Charles Chauncy, Jonathan Mayhew, and others such as Charles Grandison Finney who are not biblically orthodox Christians with heretical views, from biblically orthodox Christians. However, their emphasis and documentation in numerous areas brings out a stronger emphasis on the role Christianity played in the nation’s founding than almost all standard histories. The careful historian should weigh the differences, but I usually side with the Bartons. Also, the volume desperately needs an index, which should have been included in the Second Edition.

- **Hannah, John D. *An Invitation to Church History: American*. Grand Rapids: Kregel, 2020. A very fine work by Dr. Hannah, well organized and a lot of charts, portraits, illustrations, and maps. I highly recommend this volume, which, along with the first volume, should be one of the five histories of Christianity every pastor should own and read. Hannah’s strength lies in the area of analyzing the theology of the various leaders and movements in Church History. His explanation of the different theological systems and their impact on the development of Christianity and the Republic is invaluable.
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**Tuchman, Barbara. *The March of Folly*. New York: Random House, 1985. I have included this work because of the quality of Tuchman's work. No student of history can go wrong reading all of her writings. The chapters in this book on the "Protestant Secession," the American War for Independence, and the American War in Viet Nam are insightful and brilliant. For further reading of her I recommend her work *The Bible and the Sword* which traces the history of the Bible on English civilization, it is especially important in terms of the evangelical support for Israel from the Proctorate of Cromwell to the founding of Israel.

CHRISTIANITY IN THE ERA OF BRITISH COLONIALISM (1600–1789)

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1989. Amos takes a different approach than most. In this book and in his chapter in Wayne House, *Christian and the Constitution*, he demonstrates and documents how key phrases in the Declaration, i.e., Nature's God, unalienable rights, etc. derive from Christian thought long before the Enlightenment.
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- *Baldwin, Alice M. *The New England Clergy and the American Revolution*. New York: Frederick Ungar Publishing Co., 1965. Recognizes the vital role the clergy and Christianity played in the founding of the U.S.
- **Barton, David. *The Jefferson Lies: Exposing the Myths You've Always Believed About Thomas Jefferson*. Washington DC: WND Books, 2016. Numerous issues related to Jefferson are investigated and the record set straight. Barton does a fine, well-documented investigation and presentation of these issues.
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
